The Manual Handling Operations Regulations (MHOR) of 1992 were created as rules for businesses to follow when it comes to the risks that can be involved when manual handling occurs, this is so there is a straight forward, standardised way of managing risks in the workplace.

The Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992 define manual handling as: '...any transporting or supporting of a load (including the lifting, putting down, pushing, pulling, carrying or moving thereof) by hand or bodily force.'

The Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992 What are they, how do they affect you, and how can you best implement them? The Manual Handling Operations Regulations (often abbreviated to MHOR) is a piece of Health & Safety legislation that affects both employers and employees. It passed in to law in 1992, and was amended in 2002.

...Manual handling of loads (MHL), manual material handling (MMH) involves the use of the human body to lift, lower, fill, empty, or carry loads. The load can be animate (a person or animal) or inanimate (an object). Most manufacturing or distribution systems require some manual handling tasks.

Manual handling is regulated by legislation: Health and Safety at Work etc Act 1974 (HSWA) This is the cornerstone of safe working practices, healthy environments and avoidance of accidents in the workplace, and has sections relevant to manual handling. Manual handling is one of the main causes of workplace accidents and illnesses. The HSE report that, in 2017/18, musculoskeletal disorders made up 35% of all cases of workplace ill-health. It's important that you recognise your limits when carrying out manual handling tasks.

Manual handling is a major source of injury and the HSE have provided a lot of supporting materials and guidance for employers on how to minimise the risks involved in MH operations. The key to all of the MHO Regulations is contained in Regulation 4 and is based on proper assessment of risk.

**What are Employee's Responsibilities With Regards to Manual Handling?** It is all too easy to think that responsibility for manual handling safety rests solely upon management and that it is up to the employer to prevent harm from coming to workers.

in manual handling operations, diagrams and real cases 1 have been selected from various trades and industries to show how to improve work practices and the workplace environment to reduce the potential risks in the manual handling operations. For some particular trades with specific and manual handling accounts for typically 25% and for about 12% of all accident report forms received by the Safety Office. The Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999 and the Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992 (MHOR) require that a risk assessment is carried out on manual handling tasks.

Under the Manual Handling Operations Regulations 1992 (as amended) the employer has legal duties to: Avoid the need to carry out manual handling operations wherever possible; If manual handling cannot be avoided the task should be automated or mechanised in some way, in order to reduce the amount of manual handling required;
